### Violence

"...the intentional use of physical force or power, threatened or actual, against oneself, another person, or against a group or community that either results in or has a high likelihood of resulting in injury, death, psychological harm, maldevelopment or deprivation."

> International · Labour Office, International Council of Nurses, World Health Organization, & Public Services International, 2002



### Violence

Bullying	a person's perception of repeated negative acts such as harassment, intimidation, exclusion, isolation, hostility, character assignation and constant criticism
Verbal Abuse	a person's perception of being professional and personally attacked devalued or humiliated via the spoken word
Threat	a person's perception of an intention to inflict personal pain, harm, damage, disadvantage, or psychological harm
Physical Abuse	a person's perception of an unwelcome or uninvited action that involves physical contact with a person with the intent of causing physiological, emotional and bodily harm
Sexual Harassment	a person's perception of sexual propositioning or unwelcome sexual attention; can include behaviours such as humiliating, offensive jokes, stories, remarks or voyeurism with sexual overtones, suggestive looks or physical gestures, exposed genitalia, gifts of a sexual connotation or requests for inappropriate physical examinations, pressure for dates
Sexual Abuse	a person's perception of an unwelcome or uninvited action that involves physical contact of a sexual nature

# Workplace violence

"...workplace violence may include, but is not limited to, verbal threats, leaving threatening notes or sending threatening notes or emails in the workplace, sexual violence, throwing of objects". Ontario Ministry of Labour Occupational Health & Safety Act

"...violent acts (including physical assaults and threats of assaults) directed towards persons at work or on duty".

# Scope of the challenge



## Violence against paramedics

• systematic review of the peer-reviewed literature in 2020

- only 34 studies worldwide have examined some facet of violence (e.g., predictors of violence, incidence and prevalence, consequences of exposure to violence) against paramedics
  - 2 Canadian studies
  - n = 1,977
    - 0.05% of all paramedics in Canada
- the rate of assaults against paramedics has tripled between 2001-2014
- increasing evidence indicating gender disparity wherein female paramedic / Emergency Medical Services (EMS) personnel have a disproportionally greater risk of violence related injuries

# Violence against paramedics

approximately 2,000 Emergency Medical Services (EMS) personnel in the US are injured every year in a violence related incidence



# Under-reporting



a lack of injury or lost time

lack of supervisory or co-worker support

fear of reprisal or blame

belief that reporting will not lead to any positive changes

# Under-reporting

common perception that violence is simply "part of the job"

verbal abuse is "common"

reporting violence may be perceived as a sign of weakness

reluctance to report unintentional violence (i.e., patients with dementia)

# Protecting paramedics

- legislative protections in Australia
  - "obstructing or hindering an ambulance officer by an act of violence"
  - entitled to refuse to:
    - provide treatment if safety is at risk when attending a volatile or dangerous situation
    - treat patients until the police arrive to ensure their own safety is not at risk
- legislative protections in Canada
  - none of the above
  - no different for paramedics as it is for civilians (i.e., members of the public)





- the number lost work-days for EMS personnel due to violence related injuries is <u>22 times higher than the</u> <u>national average</u>
- in 2016, the NAEMT reported that 3,500 EMS practitioners sustained a serious enough injury to require a visit to the Emergency Department
- acts of violence against paramedics jeopardizes the quality of patient care that paramedics strive to deliver
- leads to immense financial loss in the health sector




- violence in the paramedic profession has been linked to:
  - intent to leave the profession
  - anxiety and symptoms of burnout
  - psychological strain
  - increased risk of developing Post-Traumatic Stress Injury (PTSI)
  - increased absenteeism
  - sleep difficulties
  - negative impact on relationships with others



- second-order effects
- for paramedics who experience violence, the consequences can – and do – extend to their work partners / colleagues, spouses and life partners, and family members including children










# Summary
