Minister of Mental Health and Addictions

On October 26, 2021, the Government of Canada announced the appointment of Carolyn Bennett as the **first federal Minister of Mental Health and Addictions**, as well as the Associate Minister of Health







Mandate Letter

- Commitments in the Prime Minister's Mandate Letter to the Minister of Mental Health and Addictions include:
 - Support the Minister of Public Safety to continue
 advancing Canada's first-ever National Action Plan
 on Post-Traumatic Stress Injuries
 - Support the Minister of Veterans Affairs to ensure Canadian Armed Forces members and Veterans have access to adequate mental health resources, services and training programs tailored to their specific needs
- Underlying all the commitments was the need to use the science and make decisions based on evidence





Triangulation of Evidence, Practice and Policy

Government of Canada mental health and substance use health policies, legislation and financial investments in provinces, territories and municipalities



Peer-reviewed research, evaluation and evidencebuilding by the Canadian academies



Mental health and substance use health learning health systems and clinical practice

PTSI in **PSP** Initiative

- The National Research Consortium builds the evidence base related to PTSI among PSP, under the guidance of a Public Safety Steering Committee (PSSC)
- This investment supports research and knowledge mobilization through CIHR-led strategic funding opportunities and a knowledge exchange hub led by CIPSRT

PTSI in **PSP**: Initiative Timeline

- Federal Budget 2018 announced
 \$20M investment for CIHR-CIPSRT national research consortium
- Catalyst Grants: PTSI among PSP funding opportunity launched

PTSI in PSP: Research Investments to Date

Catalyst Grants in PTSI among PSP (2018)

 22 one-year grants were funded to address research on PTSI and adverse mental health outcomes among PSP

Mental Wellness in Public Safety Team Grants (2019)

 Eight multi-year team grants were funded to address PTSI among PSP, including dedicated teams studying police and corrections personnel

Research and Coordination Hubs for Public Safety (2021)

- Informed by PSSC priorities on suicide prevention and peerto-peer support
- Funding to establish two research and coordination hubs at CAMH (CSPS) and McMaster University (OnCall app)

Investments to date are supporting researchers at more than 22 universities who are working with over 18 community organizations and many individual PSP





PTSI in PSP: Knowledge Mobilization

- CIPSRT acts as a knowledge exchange hub
- Brings together
 the research teams with
 relevant stakeholders to
 coordinate activities
 and move the knowledge
 created into policy and practice
- During the COVID-19
 pandemic, increased
 activities, knowledge
 mobilization, and delivered
 virtual services for PSP







PTSI in PSP: Impact

Knowledge User: Captain Steve Fraser, Vancouver Fire and Rescue Services

Catalyst Grant: Evaluation of a training program to protect firefighters' mental health from the effects of traumatic incidents

Project Leads: Dr. Joy MacDermid, Captain Steve Fraser, Dr. Amanda Brazil



Captain Fraser knew that research was the only way to demonstrate that the Resilient Minds training program for firefighters improves skills and is retainable over time. He wanted to ensure that the program wasn't just ticking an organizational box; the only "right way" to do that was through research.





PTSI in **PSP**: Impact

Knowledge User: Detective Constable Steve Stoken, London Police Services

Catalyst Grant: The SKIP study: Sudarshan Kriya yoga in posttraumatic stress injury (SKIP), an RCT for public safety personnel

Project Lead: Dr. Akshya Vasudev



Since participating in the SKIP study, Detective Constable Stoken has become an advocate for research within his organization. He actively seeks out researchers and recruits other officers to research programs in the hope that, like him, they will find help.
